

## PRESERVING OAK HILL'S HISTORY

Oak Hill Cemetery is in dire need of donations for a new pole barn that will serve as the cemetery office.

Since North Township assumed ownership of the abandoned cemetery at 165th and Hohman in 2012, township employees and a host of volunteers have cleaned up the site, replaced grave stones and provided much needed repairs.

Throughout that time, cemetery operations have been conducted from a donated trailer.

Trustee Frank J. Mrvan said the township needs to build a permanent structure that meets city building codes and seeking the public's help.

"We are looking to groups and individuals who can donate a few dollars to help us meet that goal."

## NEW INITIATIVES HELP TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS LIVE THEIR BEST LIFE

North Township Trustee Frank J. Mrvan is expanding the reach of the township's Mrvan Cares initiative.

It began with No More Secrets and its focus on reducing the incidence of childhood sexual abuse through education and educator training. Since that program began nearly three years ago, Mrvan Cares has evolved to include programs to reduce opioid use, dating violence and dangers posed to individuals with autism and other developmental disorders.

Mrvan said the more he learns about factors that predispose individuals to lifelong struggles, the more determined he is to finding solutions.

"Every person deserves to lead their best life," he said. "For children who are abused and don't receive assistance to deal with the ongoing impacts of that abuse, their likelihood of developing substance abuse issues, depression, even Post Traumatic Stress Disorder increases exponentially. We are here to make a difference in their lives."

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## ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM HELPS TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS SAVE ON UTILITIES

Up to \$500 is available for qualifying township residents who need assistance paying winter heating costs.

Assistant Chief Deputy Gilda Orange said the township is helping residents qualify for the Northwest Indiana Community Action Energy Assistance Program at Circle of Services in Hessville; and at the East Chicago and Hammond township offices.

"Those who qualify can receive \$200-\$500 as a one-time payment this winter," Orange said. "What we do is help residents qualify."

EAP is available by appointment only from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday at the East Chicago and Hohman Avenue township offices and from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Fridays at Circle of Services.

### **SHOVELING ASSISTANCE**

North Township wants to match seniors, who need help digging out, with volunteers, who have a shovel or snowblower. During heavy snow, the township implements an automated call system to help those who are snowed-in and need help getting out.

## **BREAKING THE CYCLE OF SEXUAL ABUSE**

As No More Secrets continues to roll out around the state, closer to home North Township is expanding the program's reach to more local school districts.

Township Community Development Coordinator Rosie Quintanilla said there is an ongoing need to help teachers identify children who may be suffering silently as victims of sexual abuse.

Whiting and Munster schools along with the Catholic Diocese of Gary schools are looking to implement the No More Secrets curriculum at all grade levels by the end of 2019.

East Chicago Det. Justin Orange is preparing to lead the first police training session in February designed to help officers understand how to best address special needs individuals who may wander away from home unattended.


The next step: East Chicago will launch North Township's Autism Awareness initiative in April.

"Justin looks like any other normal kid," he said. "You wouldn't know anything was different until you talk to him. We want to keep all of the Justin's in this area safe."
